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ABOUT THE CLIENT

World Vision New Zealand (WVNZ) is a registered charity helping the most vulnerable children, in the most difficult places, to overcome poverty and injustice and build brighter futures for themselves. As one of New Zealand's Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade's Negotiated Partnership pilot NGOs, WVNZ manages a multi-country, outcomes-focused development programs—coordinating implementing partners, adaptive management, and evidence generation across complex, remote contexts.

CHALLENGE

At the conclusion of the program's first phase (covering the first 5 years) conducted across 5 countries, focusing on child protection, nutrition, and livelihoods, WVNZ required an independent endline evaluation to assess progress against long and medium outcomes against the program's goals. This evaluation needed to be responsive to gender and social inclusion, methodologically rigorous, and comparable to baseline and midterm findings, all while generating actionable insights for the next phase of the program that were gender, disability and socially inclusive. Coordinating data collection in Laos, Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands, Timor-Leste, and Vanuatu presented significant logistical and cultural challenges.

SOLUTION

FLUSH conducted an endline evaluation of the WOVEN Programme, creating tailored data collection tools, which were translated into local languages and administered by highly-qualified country leads. The final report balanced rigor with readability—weaving quantitative trend data with community voices to tell a coherent story of what changed and why. FLUSH also identified which of the 57 program indicators had limited evaluative utility, providing WVNZ with concrete guidance to streamline monitoring requirements for Phase 2. The report's actionable recommendations on cross-country learning, adaptive management, and M&E simplification gave WVNZ and MFAT a clear evidence base to refine program design going forward.
